



"Being Faithful Through Testing Times "

Standing up to tyrants, no matter what the cost. That kind of courage has been in the headlines since the war in Ukraine began, as many brave people have defied Putin's oppression.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer did not have Putin to contend with, but Hitler. Bonhoeffer did not back down either, when the time came.

Bonhoeffer grew up with no thought of ever defying the leader of Germany. Nothing could have been further from his mind or background. Born at Breslau in Silesia (now the Polish city of Wroclaw) in 1906, Bonhoeffer was the son of an academic. In 1912, his father was appointed to be Professor of Psychiatry and Neurology at Berlin University, and so the family moved to Berlin.

Bonhoeffer never even considered going into politics. Instead, he studied theology in Tubingen, Berlin and New York, before returning to Berlin as a lecturer in theology in 1931.

But though Bonhoeffer did not chase political trouble, it soon came to him. For on 30th January 1933 Adolf Hitler, leader of the National Socialist German Workers' Party, had come to power. His totalitarian approach left no room for anyone in public life to disagree with him. Including anyone in the two major churches – Lutheran and Catholic.

But Bonhoeffer refused to be compliant, and joined the Confessing Church, which had formed in opposition to the takeover of the Lutheran Church. The Confessing Church also opposed Hitler's attempts to force antisemitism on the church and society.

Bonhoeffer was in America when war broke out in 1939, but he returned to Germany.

He said: "I shall have no right to participate in the reconstruction of Christian life in Germany after the war, if I do not share the trials of this time with my people."

Back in Germany, he joined the underground anti-Nazi opposition and worked hard to oppose Hitler.

In 1943 he was arrested and imprisoned at Tegel prison in Berlin. The involvement of many of his contacts in the July 1944 plot to kill Hitler

may well have sealed his fate. He was finally moved on to Flossenberg concentration camp.

In April 1945, as American troops were approaching the camp, Bonhoeffer was hanged. The last words of this brilliant and courageous 39-year-old opponent of Nazism were:

"This is the end - for me, the beginning of life."

Bonhoeffer left a great legacy behind him. His writings, and especially his Letters and Papers from Prison, have inspired many trying to make sense of persecution and needless suffering. His 1937 book The Cost of Discipleship is described as a modern classic.

Session Report

We have had two meetings since my last report, one in January and the other early March. In January our Treasurer advised of an anonymous donation of $\pounds 2,000$ to our community fund and a very generous legacy of $\pounds 10,000$ from Mrs Sandra Tumilty. Our Property Convenor brought us up to date with some works carried out relating to church lighting, painting of the vestry, Church Officer's room, Session Room and vestibule. Our Halls Convenor advised that he was receiving many requests for our already busy halls and these were from a diverse group of would be users. He felt it was time to clarify our user policy and update our letting agreement and his committee would be meeting soon to do this


The Worship and Development Convenor announced that there would be a new Lenten Study beginning in March with the theme "Discipleship Explored" and that after two and a half years of fund raising for "Trees for Life" which has enabled the planting of over 2,000 trees in the Scottish Highlands, it had been decided to change and support another environmental charity. The committee recommended the "Ayrshire River Trust" and this was agreed.

At our March meeting the Property Convenor had a longer report than usual bringing us up to date with work required after the damage caused by storm "Eowyn". Roof repairs had been carried out as a temporary measure with a return proposed when a "Cherry Picker" was available. A sum of £5,000 had been agreed with our insurers for this. The cross on the South Transept roof had fallen and was beyond repair. Other minor repairs had also been undertaken. It was also advised that we had a visit from Environmental Health regarding kitchen procedures and a number of new requirements have to be implemented, including recording of temperatures for cooked food and clear labelling of stored items with dates. Our Treasurer then presented the first annual report and accounts for the combined Alloway and Fisherton Parish Church. She highlighted a few points from the accounts including that although we had a projected deficit of £37,000 we did in fact have an £11,000 surplus. This was mainly due to donations and legacies. Although our income had increased from £302,000 in 2023 to £314,000 in 2024 our expenditure had increased from £285,000 in 2023 to £303,000 in

2024. Expenditure had increased mainly because of a 62% increase in energy costs, an increased payment to our Giving to Grow contribution to the Church of Scotland and some salary increases. The accounts were formally proposed, seconded and approved. Our Treasurer received warm applause for all her skilled and excellent work on our behalf. After these figures were presented it was no surprise to hear that there would soon be a Stewardship meeting which would consider how we should respond to the challenges ahead.

Our technical team also reported some issues following the storm but fortunately these had been resolved. It may be however, that some of the equipment needs to be updated. The Mission Convenor encouraged all to continue their support for the lunches, the proceeds from which are required in Bandawe for essential roof repairs. Our Presbytery Elder advised that Rev David Donaldson (one of our previous trainees) had his induction service on 22nd February at Mauchline Parish Church with good support from our congregation. Finally, David Hume reported on some of his on-going work including Pulse, Stay and Play and advised that the next Men's Breakfast would be on March 29th featuring a speaker who had previously worked for the British Army, Special Branch and the Intelligence Service.

Riding for the Disabled - Volunteering Opportunity

Helping out at RDA must be one of the most enjoyable forms of volunteering. Working with the young people is so rewarding. Many of them are starting out in life with challenges most of us can only begin to imagine and it is a privilege to see the enjoyment they get from their time on horseback.

For some riding offers a freedom of movement not usually accessible to them, for others, the relationship with the horse is paramount. Either way it is a worthwhile activity for rider and helper alike.

The volunteer group, are a great bunch of people to work with, friendly and sociable - the session flies in. We could always do with a few more volunteers though, it takes three helpers to enable a child to ride safely, especially in the beginning stages.

Training is available, and you learn lots "on the job" and from the coaches and fellow volunteers.

You don't have to be experienced in handling horses, (although that's helpful) just to be comfortable around them is enough to start with.

The main thing is to have empathy for the young people, the rest will fall into place.

RDA offer sessions on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday mornings as well as Tuesday evenings.
