Schools Rev. Neil and I had the privilege of attending the Remembrance Service at Alloway Primary School on Friday 10th November. The Primary 7 pupils led this service and they had clearly spent a great deal of time practising - they were word perfect and very sensitive in their recognition of the service given by our armed forces over the years. The children attending Scripture Union at Doonfoot and Alloway Primary schools have been enjoying learning about the story of Joseph. Rehearsals for the Alloway Primary Nativity are now underway and we look forward to the performances in church on 12th and 13th December. The pupils and staff of Doonfoot Primary have their Christmas Service in church on 19th December followed by the Alloway Primary Christmas Service on 22nd December.

We had another amazing turnout at Messy Church on 11th November when we had an early look at the nativity story. We have our Christingle Service on Sunday 17th December at 3.00pm. Children (and adults) are invited



to come along dressed as a character from the Nativity. During the service we will be making Christingles and also making baubles to hang on a Christmas tree. The next meeting of Messy Church is on Saturday 13th January when we will be thinking about the story of Noah.

Stepping Stones The autumn programme of Stepping Stones ended on Friday 1st December. What a privilege it has been to lead this group which aims to provide support for folks who have been bereaved as they journey through the grief process. What's happening?

On the morning of Saturday 7 October, Hamas launched a wave of rocket attacks and stormed into Israel.

To date in the conflict 1,400 Israelis have been killed and 5,400 injured. Israeli civilians, including women and children, have been forcibly taken.

In Gaza, over 10,818 Palestinians have been killed and 26,905 have been injured. Airstrikes have caused widespread destruction of homes, schools, healthcare facilities and telecommunication installations.

Hospitals that are already at breaking point are overwhelmed by casualties, while over a million people have been displaced. With Gaza's only power plant running out of fuel, cuts are affecting hospitals, closing food supply to shops and access to water and sanitation services. All schools are closed.

What is Christian Aid doing in response?

Christian Aid has been working with the poorest and most vulnerable people in the Middle East since the early 1950s, when we provided humanitarian relief to Palestinian refugees.

Our established partners in Gaza are responding as best they can, under intense pressure, with medical relief and community-led initiatives such as food, shelter, sanitation and cash. However, it is extremely dangerous to move around, and supplies of essentials are running perilously low.

In southern Gaza, our partner is responding to those most recently displaced to south Gaza as a result of the war. They're providing:

Mattresses

Medicines (e.g., for people with chronic illnesses)

Emergency food from a community kitchen for approximately 200 displaced people.

We're actively exploring ways in which we might also support Israeli civilians who've been directly impacted by the violence.

Your donations can make a huge difference to the current conditions of those affected.

21st Dec The Longest Night and The Shortest Day

A Midwinter festival has been a part of life since pre-Christian times. When the hours of daylight are fewest, the warmth of the sun weakest, and life itself seemingly at a standstill, our ancestors, the pagan peoples of Europe and Western Asia, kept festival by lighting bonfires and decorating their buildings with evergreens.

Perhaps they believed that the dying sun could be enheartened by fire, and the life of the buried seed assured by the presence of evergreen branches.

With the advent of Christianity, the Spring gods became identified with Christ, and the birthday of the sun with the birthday of the Light of the World.

The early church father Tertullian did not approve of Christmas decorations. "Let those who have no light in themselves light candles!... You are the light of the world; you are the tree ever green..."

But by the time of St Gregory and St Augustine, four centuries later, this had changed. Pope Gregory instructed Augustine not to worry about harmless outward customs, as long as the right God be worshipped through them.

And so many Anglo-Saxon customs were never discarded, but simply endowed with a new significance. So, enjoy your trees!

Encouragement Corner

Hindrances

In the business of the Christmas season have you ever taken a moment to stop, take some quiet time to consider what this hustle and bustle is really all about and what we are actually celebrating?

Matthew 1:23 tells us that a child would be born and be called Emmanuel. That being interpreted "God with us." Almighty God left heaven, became a man and dealt with the sin that separates us from Him. Our relationship with God is the most important decision we will make in this life and we need to clear all hindrances to that out of the way.

In this month's Encouragement Corner I want to take a look at some of the things that keep us from knowing the peace and joy that an unbroken relationship with God our Father affords.

There are many examples throughout the Bible of individuals who for a variety of reasons experienced separation from God. Jonah who tried to run away from God's will for his life and ended up inside a big fish. Adam and Eve whose disobedience caused their expulsion from the Garden of Eden to name a few. However, I want to concentrate on some individuals who came face to face with Jesus in this respect.

Nicodemus Jn 3:1ff

This man is described as "A ruler among the Jews." Someone in a place of authority in the synagogue, respected by the ordinary worshippers and very aware of his position in society. He had heard about the things Jesus was teaching and of the miracles He was performing and acknowledged that only someone from God could do and say these things. He should have, with his background, recognised who Jesus was - the long predicted and expected Messiah! But pride, status and perhaps a little bit of disbelief was blocking his approach to God so he came secretly by night hoping that no one had seen him.

Zaccaeus. Luke 19: 2ff

Chief among the tax collectors, and just a thought could he perhaps have been Matthews boss! He was very rich and commentators say that he may well have abused his position to enrich himself. He was however a very small man and stature and money were contributing

factors to the blocks in his relationship with God. This man quickly realised how to overcome his problems, he climbed a tree, met Jesus face to face and showed practical repentance by giving half of his goods to the poor.

The Rich Young Ruler. Matt 19:16ff

We all know his story. He was a very adherent Jew. He kept God's law to the letter and was probably a stickler for tradition which was a large part of his problem. Reminds us a bit of Tevye (Fiddler on the Roof). However, the major factor for this young man was his love of money. When challenged by Jesus to give it all away and follow Him he left the presence of Almighty God sorrowful and unfulfilled.

Blind Bartimeus. Mk 10:46ff

I want to spend a few moments talking about the garment Bartimaeus cast aside. It is described as a large square with slits for sleeves. It was worn at all times especially at night to keep the wearer warm and to carry all sorts of items within it. In the case of this poor blind man he probably carried all his worldly possessions, limited though they were, inside this mantle. He came face to face with Jesus his Saviour and his healer and nothing on earth was going to stop him from getting what he came for. Certainly not a big cloak. He threw aside the cumbersome garment and ran to Jesus uninhibited. He gained his sight and the new life that is ours in Jesus by letting nothing get in the way.

Can I finish by asking, what is hindering you from healing your relationship with God? Is it unbelief, disbelief, money, position in the church or in society, rebellion against God's plan for your life or pride. I recommend that you be like Bartimaeus and cast off the thing that is a hindrance in your life and start this Christmas season with the new life promised by Jesus.

Hiding in Plain Sight

A Pope, A Cardinal and two or three Bishops have been discovered hiding in plain sight in Alloway Parish Church. They are Pope Gregory, Cardinal Jerome (Hieronymus), Bishop Augustine and Bishop Ambrose, collectively known as the four early "doctors" of the Western Church. They have been looking down on the congregation from the Houldsworth Window since it was installed 133 years ago. The identity of the "fifth doctor" is uncertain. The window has some enigmatic symbolism and in some ways, it can be seen as prescient in its content, it is a positive harbinger for the developing role of women in Church and society as well as signaling the friendship between the Roman Catholic Church and the Church of Scotland.

The window is, of course, a legacy of our congregation's journey of faith: Alloway is one of the fortunate congregations for whom that legacy will continue beyond the current planned closure of Church buildings. For many that will not be the case. In researching our window, I was in contact with Christ Church Cathedral in Dublin (Church of Ireland) who also have a window featuring the four doctors. I discovered that the Church of Ireland seem to treasure the heritage found in stained glass having completed an audit of all their windows, having a research student with a project on the Cathedral's stained glass and organising a conference on various aspects of stained glass windows.

I am saddened to see many Ayrshire Churches with some lovely stained class closing or have closed, and I see little policy in the Central Church concerning the fate of these windows.

To lose your building is sad, to also lose your heritage is tragic.

Alloway Remembrance

Beautiful and very respectful poppy decorations and displays were put up both in the Church and the Fellowship Lounge by a group from the congregation. Information sheets remembering all the local service men and woman were displayed in the Fellowship Lounge front window, the display was surrounded by a decorated sewn voile using poppies knitted by members of the congregation, as well as some WI members. There was a new wooden poppy addition supplied by 'Steeley' - the same gentleman who is responsible for the carvings in the Poppy Walk in Rozelle. He was also responsible for the large wooden poppies which adorned the front railings of the Church. They were cared for and fixed to the fencing by members of the congregation.

Named wooden crosses were placed in the shape of a cross in the Garden of Remembrance at the side wall of the Church, and on individual graves in the cemetery. Alloway Cubs decorated clay poppies and the Brownies painted stones.


