This Christmas it is time to gather around the crib again. Time for His love to be reborn in our hearts.


It is a love which for our day and age has to be as resilient and vulnerable as the love that first appeared gurgling in a manger over 2000 years ago.

I heard the Bells on Christmas Day

Christmas 1864 was the birth of this famous poem.

Longfellow sat alone on Christmas Day 1864, a 57-year-old widowed father of six, his eldest son still healing from near-paralysis as his nation bled. He had lost his wife in a tragic accident three years earlier.

The bells of Cambridge rang out their yearly message of "peace on earth, good will to men," but the words seemed to mock the reality of his own world.

Yet as he listened, something profound began to stir in his poet's heart. The resulting verses would move from despair to defiant hope!

I heard the Bells on Christmas Day

I heard the bells on Christmas day Their old familiar carols play, And wild and sweet the words repeat Of peace on earth, good will to men.

And in despair I bowed my head:
'There is no peace on earth,' I said
'For hate is strong, and mocks the song
Of peace on earth, good will to men.'

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep: 'God is not dead, nor doth He sleep;
The wrong shall fail, the right prevail,
With peace on earth, good will to men.'

Till, ringing, singing on its way,
The world revolved from night to day
A voice, a chime, a chant sublime,
Of peace on earth, good will to men.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

The poem which became a song endures because it speaks honestly to the human struggle between faith and doubt. Longfellow's hymn acknowledges the reality of suffering while ultimately declaring God's sovereignty.

When the world seems darkest, when peace seems furthest away, the bells still ring out their defiant message of hope.

The Christmas bells still ring, and their message resonates down the years unchanged: in God's time, wrong shall fail, right prevail, with peace on earth, good will to all people.

Session Update

There have been two further meetings of session since the last report, one on 16th October and the other on 19th November. In October no financial report was given other than to let us know that things were running well and a detailed report would be given in December. We did hear however, that out Stewardship Campaign was producing excellent results with healthy increases being pledged by members.

Property Report—Our planned new kitchen upgrades have been completed and early feedback was very good. Remaining improvements, including new windows and lighting will be undertaken in 2026.

Other committee reports advised that our halls are running well.

Social Committee—The Committee are working away as usual providing teas/coffees and planning the next family Beetle Drive

Communications and Technology—The team were coping well with what was asked of them although further help there would be appreciated.

Mission Committee—The convenor confirmed the dates for the Christmas Fair (6th December) and New Year concert (6th February) and advised that she would need lots of helpers for baking/stalls etc.

Worship and Development—The convenor advised that they would be stopping their Wednesday coffee and chat group and this would allow the Wednesday Worship group to meet every week. Donald also confirmed that our Autumn Study meetings had started and feedback was good with everyone enjoying the format of praise, video and short discussion. He also confirmed that the £750 collected at our church summer opening had been presented to the Salvation Army with a request that it be used locally.

Neil advised that he had 4 people attending his new communicants' class and if all went well he hoped they would be joining in December.

Schools and Family Worker—David Hume then reported that all was well with schools and youth groups. Toddlers now have a limit of 45 and Pulse was attracting around 38. The three primary schools had been asked if they would like to help with the food shortage in Malawi and they had agreed raising over £950.

Presbytery and Safeguarding - There was nothing for Bill to report on Safeguarding and not much from Presbytery although he advised much time had been spent on discussing churches that were vacant but not in vacancy and how it would affect vacancy allowances which some churches relied upon. He also advised that he had been appointed Interim Moderator at St James while Neil had been appointed Interim Moderator at Ayr St Andrews.

At our November meeting we had a fairly full report from our Treasurer. Lorna advised that since we had now received all our legacies and paid a lower than budgeted sum for our new kitchen renovation our accounts were currently showing a surplus of £58,742 instead of a deficit of £72,500. Other income received included a donation from the Chat and Tat group and a payment of £2,500 from the National Trust as payment for usage of the access footpath.

£2,000 has been sent to the Bandawe Primary school for food (this included the Primary schools' contribution)

Neil then asked the court for approval to split our Christmas offerings and use them to support the work of the Street Pastors and our Malawi Students (school fees here have increased by 50% this year). This was agreed.

Anne Law, our Stewardship Convenor, then gave us a further update on our Stewardship Campaign reporting some excellent news. The amount of increase indicated from members is in the region of £44,000 including gift aid and thirty new gift aid forms have been completed. Neil praised the congregation for their generosity and thanked all the team who worked hard on organising, collecting and processing all the required information.

Other committees reported all was well and were getting ready for a busy time ahead. The Clerk, that's me, brought forward two items of business which require approval on a yearly basis. A Conflict of Interest form which has to be completed showing any elder who may have, in the event of a vote being taken, an interest which might influence their decision. The other is our Recording Policy which is displayed at both doors as you enter the church and advises any at the service that it will be recorded. This wording has to be agreed each year and altered if appropriate.

David then brought us up to date with his youth and schools work where all is going well and mentioned that the recent Messy Church had 49 children plus parents and grand parents attending. He thanked all those who helped with his work without whom he would struggle to cope. He also mentioned that the five week autumn study course "Facing the Canon" had now finished and appeared to have proved very successful. It may be repeated in the future.

Again before we closed we heard the names of the four new members who had completed the communicant's class and will be joining the church next Sunday. Encouraging news.

Last month, members of 1st Alloway Boys Brigade gathered for a practical and potentially life-saving workshop: CPR and AED use. Led by our guest, Mr Anderson and Mrs Moore (O.I.C) gave the boys hands-on experience learning how to respond confidently during cardiac emergencies.

During the training, attendees practised CPR, learned how to recognise when someone needs help, and became familiar with using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). Through demonstrations and guided practice, many commented on how simple—and how important—these skills truly are.

The training reflects our church's and BB'S commitment to caring for one another in both spiritual and practical ways. By equipping members with lifesaving knowledge, we strengthen our ability to serve not just inside our walls but in our homes, schools, workplaces, and neighbourhoods.

Although it is a very serious subject, we make learning fun and take a little bit of the fear away.

We encourage all our boys to consider participating. A few hours of learning could one day make a life-saving difference.

We have been very busy at Brownies recently, and a few weeks ago we had a Pyjama & Quiz Night. The Brownies all came along in their jimjams and slippers and brought their teddies. We had a 'Cuddly Toy' competition - well, it wasn't exactly a competition because there wasn't an overall winner and everyone received a certificate with loads of different awards such as 'The Fluffiest Cuddly Toy', 'The Jolliest Cuddly Toy', 'The Cutest Eyes', 'The Longest Tail', 'Best Dressed Cuddly Toy' and lots of other categories. So everyone was a winner! We had a quiz that had originally been put together by our old Barn Owl Sonya Hill a few years ago.

For our Pumpkin Party the Brownies all dressed up - some were rather scary! - and after a Parade around the room showing their costumes, we played some games. They went around the room in their Brownie Sixes to 4 different activities - Little Owl Lara tied doughnuts up on a stick with string and the Brownies had to try and eat them without using their hands; Snowy Owl Sam had the Feely Box where the Brownies were invited to put their hand in a hole in the box to feel something spooky! They were told it was 'wiggly worms' (cold spaghetti), 'witches eyeballs' (wet grapes), and 'body parts' (jellied Halloween sweeties)! Some of the Brownies were too scared to try, they would put their hand out and then snatch it back at the last minute! Our new Duke of Edinburgh Owl Abigail did a balloon ghost game where they had to keep a white balloon up in the air for as long as possible; and Brown Owl did 'Dookin For Apples' dropping a fork into a bowl of apples to try and catch one. They all had lots of fun. Everyone made a ghost craft by cutting out a circle of white cotton fabric and drawing a face on it, then threading it over an empty Actimel bottle tied on a string - when they moved the string up and down the fabric sort of swirled around as if it was floating through the airl

We also had Remembrance Night when the Brownies wrote messages to their soldier on paper chains - some of the messages were very moving. We displayed the chain in Church. Several Brownies came along to the Remembrance Service and Parade carrying our flag in the Church and then parading up to the War Memorial.

The Brownies worked towards their Charities badge, and for Children in Need we made Pudsey rosettes for the Brownies to wear to school. We had a collection for Dibora who is the little girl in Ethiopia who the Brownies sponsor through the charity PLAN, the Brownies did helpful jobs at home and raised £31.25 - well done and thank you to everyone.




