Following on from the success of Alpha@Alloway, we are pleased to announce that we will be running a 'Be Still' Course in the Autumn.

The 'Be Still' Course is designed to help Christian fellowships explore together how to grow and develop a regular 'Quiet Time' with God. The course is suitable for anyone who is interested in exploring what a personal 'Quiet Time' with God looks like and the course is suitable for those who are new, or interested in Christian faith, and for those who have been Christians for a while. As well as covering the basics of a 'Quiet Time', the 'Be Still' Course goes deeper into themes like perseverance, imagination and how to step out into the world in mission. The course is part of the 24-7 Prayer Movement.

The course will comprise five main sessions, though we will include a sixth session to have a 'movie night' to watch the Christian film 'War Room'. Each session will include a short time of worship, a video presentation, small group discussions and the opportunity to enjoy hospitality.

The main sessions will run from 7.00-8.30pm on Tuesday 11^{th} October through to Tuesday 8^{th} November. The 'movie night' will be on Tuesday 25^{th} November from 7.00-9.15pm.

What fun we had at our 'Bible Heroes Holiday Club' that ran from 15th-19th August. During the week, we had 19 children attending, and together we enjoyed games, video messages, stories, crafts and (of course) a snack!

The Unitary Constitution

Given that the congregation of Alloway will soon be entering a union with Fisherton Church, the congregation will be obliged in time by church law to change its constitution from the Model Constitution to the Unitary Constitution

What is the main difference?

Under our present set up the financial and temporal matters of the church are dealt with by a Congregational Board. If we adopt the unitary constitution the Board will be dissolved, and all these matters will be handled by the Kirk Session. The trustees of the congregation would be the members of the Kirk Session; those who previously were elected to the Board at the annual congregational meeting would no longer be trustees.

Who sits on the Kirk Session?

The Minister normally convenes, moderates or chairs the meeting of the Kirk Session which is comprised of minister(s) and elders. They can appoint a clerk and a treasurer who need not be elders and who would attend meetings but would not by virtue of this office become session members.

Could anyone else sit on the Session?

Session meetings are normally open meetings and so any member can be present - except in certain sensitive matters where it meets in private. Former Board members who do not wish to be elders could be co-opted and so still be part of the management process of the church - and their ideas and help may well be of great value to the session, but they would not be session members. It might be that in time this exposure to the wider affairs of the church would help them to feel motivated towards becoming elders.

What difference would the unitary constitution bring?

There would not be a separation between the spiritual and temporal matters of the church which in practice are not totally separate. For example, stewardship, giving, the use of buildings is not just about property and money. It would also mean that all the charity trustees would have a say over all the activities of the congregation and not

just some of the activities: currently trustees who are only Board members only make decisions over some areas whereas being trustees they are in a sense responsible for the whole.

How will the decision be made?

Given Kirk Session approval, the congregation as a whole will shortly be invited to support the change of constitution after the service on Sept 11th, 2022.

If supportive, a request goes to the church's Edinburgh offices. They alone have the power to allow us to adopt the new constitution.

What is the Church of Scotland's preferred option?

In 2016 the General Assembly decided that congregations who still have Congregational Boards should be urged, or strongly encouraged to move to the unitary model. In future adjustments the Unitary Constitution will become the norm.

Alloway Church Harvest Appeal



The Amazon Hope Medical Programme began in 2002, steadily growing each year so that by 2013 the program was working in six river basins (Amazon, Manití, Ucayali, Puinahua, Tigre and Marañón).

In 2014 the Programme increased its collaboration activities with the Regional Government of Loreto through its teams of Comprehensive Health Care for Excluded and Remote Populations (AISPED).

As a result of this successful collaboration, in 2017, this work was expanded to coincide with the arrival of Vine Trust's latest medical ship, the MV Forth Hope which more than doubled the capacity to provide health services to the riverine communities.

By the end of 2020, the Amazon Hope Programme had provided over 1.7 million consultations since its services began.

CHURCH OPENING - SUMMER 2022

This summer has seen our first Church Open Season since 2019, pre-pandemic.

We opened on the 23rd May and closed on the 24th August. Over that 13-week period, we have welcomed over 900 visitors to our Sanctuary. That welcome is only possible because of the 63 volunteers from the congregation - who Church - sat through the summer. Some volunteers went above and beyond, namely George Lennie with 14 sessions, just ahead of Sheena Kemp and Mary Hughes with 11 sessions each. To all our volunteers a big Thank You - well done! Not forgetting our team of 11 supervisors who opened and closed the Sanctuary each day during their duty week.

It is very satisfying and fun to welcome visitors and some great conversations were had. Our visitors this year came from all parts of the world - Scotland, England, Wales, Ireland, USA, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, France, Germany, Greece, China, India, Malaysia, Egypt, Russia and Ukraine (who came in together - good to see that!). We encourage visitors to sign our book and they usually make comments, a selection is -

Donations left by visitors amounted to some £900, which will be sent to this season's local charity, Whiteleys Retreat, which provides respite care for children and their families affected by cancer and other life limiting conditions.

It is a joy to chat with our visitors and leave them with a positive memory of Alloway. If you have not done a volunteer session, try it in 2023, you might just enjoy yourself.

"The farm park is a great place to go to have fun with your family and friends." Riona




