



23rd April – St George's Day

English people have a patron saint who isn't English, about whom next to nothing is known for sure, and who, just possibly, may not have existed at all

But that didn't stop St George being patriotically invoked in many battles, notably at Agincourt and in the Crusades, and of course it is his cross that adorns the flags of English football fans to this day.

It's most likely that St George was a soldier, a Christian who was martyred for his faith somewhere in Palestine, possibly at Lydda, in the early fourth century.

At some point in the early centuries of the Church he became associated with wider military concerns, being regarded as the patron saint of the Byzantine armies. There is no doubt that St George was held as an example of the 'godly soldier', one who served Christ as bravely and truly as he served his king and country.

The story of George and the dragon is of much later date and no one seems to know where it comes from. By the Middle Ages, when George was being honoured in stained glass, the dragon had become an invaluable and invariable visual element, so that for most people the two are inseparable. Pub signs have a lot to answer for here: 'The George and Dragon'.

However, it's probably more profitable to concentrate on his role as a man who witnessed to his faith in the difficult setting of military service, and in the end was martyred for his faithfulness to Christ.

The idea of the 'Christian soldier' was, of course, much loved by the Victorian hymn-writers - 'Onward, Christian soldiers!' The soldier needs discipline.

The heart of his commitment is to obedience. The battle cannot be avoided nor the enemy appeased. He marches and fights alongside others, and he is loyal to his comrades. In the end, if the battle is won, he receives the garlands of victory, the final reward of those who overcome evil

St George's Day presents a challenge and an opportunity. The challenge is to distance the message of his life from the militarism and triumphalism that can easily attach itself to anything connected to soldiers and fighting.

The opportunity is to celebrate the ideal of the 'Christian soldier' - one who submits to discipline, sets out to obey God truly, does not avoid the inevitable battle with all that is unjust, wrong and hateful in our world, and marches alongside others fighting the same noble cause.

Discipline, obedience, courage, fellowship and loyalty - they're not the most popular virtues today, but that doesn't mean that they don't deserve our admiration!

Many Brownie Units throughout Girlguiding Ayrshire South joined Renfrewshire Brownies in March for an amazing Brownies Sleepover at Glasgow Science Centre! Over 400 Brownies and their Leaders had exclusive use of the Science Centre after it had closed to the public on Friday evening, and we left before the Centre reopened to the public on Saturday morning. There was lots of fun (and not a lot of sleep) in between!

We arrived by coach on the Friday evening and were met by the wonderful Science Centre staff who had organised timed programmes for each Unit. After dropping off all our luggage and sleeping bags in an allocated storage area, we had use of all the amazing interactive science exhibits throughout 3 floors. We watched a very funny and noisy live theatre Science Show presentation called 'Fantastic Forces', and several Brownies were invited on stage to take part in science experiments - not all of which went to plan! We also had a lovely relaxing half hour in the dark Planetarium watching the sky at night projected on to the enormous planetarium domed ceiling, while a member of staff pointed out the different constellations and told stories about them. At times it really felt like we were moving through space!

We had time slots to visit the Girlguiding gift shop and a tuck shop. All the Brownies joined together for hot chocolate and snacks. After that, each Unit chose an area to put sleeping bags and mats on the floor - amongst the exhibits! We found a great spot near to the enormous glass windows overlooking the night lights of Glasgow and the River Clyde, and we even spotted the Waverley moored up

outside. But it still wasn't time for bed - we had another couple of hours of playing and exploring the games and optical illusions, such as the wonky shaped room where Leaders ended up looking much smaller than Brownies! There were challenges and puzzles, and the Brownies didn't tire at all! However, we had been warned that the lights would go out at midnight, so before then we all got ready for bed and settled into sleeping bags on mats on the floor. Once the lights were out, we could look out of the huge windows at the wonderful panoramic view of Glasgow's twinkling lights, it was magical. Some of the Brownies fell asleep almost instantly, others took time to settle in the unusual surroundings, but it was a wonderful experience.

The lights suddenly came on before 6.00am, and it was time to get up and pack up our belongings. Then everyone met together for breakfast of muffins, juice, fruit, yogurt and pancakes. We thanked all the Leaders, everyone received a badge and certificate, and then it was time to get on the coaches and head back. The Brownies were much quieter on the way back than they had been on the way there!

ENCOURAGEMENT CORNER

Choices

Day by day as we live this life we are faced with choices, some fairly large like choosing a profession, choosing where to live or choosing which house to buy.

Some small but at the moment of choosing no less important. What will I eat or what will I wear, will I walk to the shops or will I take the car. One thing is sure our choices are either good ones or bad ones. They are either right or wrong but inevitably they all have consequences.

The bible and history are full of illustrations of the choices that people have made and the outcomes of those choices.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Heb.12.1 reminds us that we are "surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses" of whom men like Dietrich Bonhoeffer stand tall. He is one of my personal heroes of the faith and we can learn much from his experience with his God.

Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran pastor, author, theologian and an anti-nazi dissident. In 1939 he went on a second visit to the United States at the invitation of a theological seminary in New York but quickly came to the conclusion that he had made a mistake and returned to Germany. It was at this juncture that he made what was to be for him a very costly but correct choice. "I must live through this difficult period in our national history along with the people of Germany. I will have no right to participate in the reconstruction of Christian life in Germany after the war if I do not share the trials of this time with my people."

This choice resulted on the 9th April 1945 in his death by hanging at the hands of the nazi regime.

Charles "Chuck" Colson

Colson was an American attorney and political advisor to Richard Nixon. He was described as Nixon's hard man and "valuable to the President because I was willing to be ruthless in getting things done." As an individual he chose the glories of this life which resulted in him being indicted for conspiring to cover up the Watergate burglaries. Not initially a very good choice but God can and does work all things to His glory.

While facing arrest a friend gave him a copy of Mere Christianity by C.S. Lewis which resulted in his conversion. A very good choice to make. As already pointed out, actions have consequences and he had to pay the price for the mistakes made during his life in politics. He served seven months in prison during which time he became convinced that God wanted him to develop a ministry to prisoners.

After his release he founded the Prison Fellowship 1976 and Prison Fellowship International 1979.

Joshua

After bringing the people to the land, promised to them by God, he reminded them all what God had done for them and challenged them to put aside their idols and choose who they were going to serve. He then uttered the momentous words "as for me and my house we will serve the Lord." No ambiguity there. Happily during his lifetime, and that of the elders who outlived him and who had known all that God had done for them Israel as a nation remained faithful to their promise to trust God. (Joshua 24.)

Ruth

We are all very familiar with the response of Ruth when invited by Na'omi to return to her own people and her own land, "Entreat me not to leave you.....your people shall be my people and your God shall be my God." A very good choice.

I am always a little surprised when people express the opinion that when you become a Christian you have to give up a lot! That is so untrue when you consider the life of Ruth. The opposite is in fact the truth. She went on to marry an extremely wealthy man, to become the great grandmother of King David and even more importantly she appears in the genealogy of the Lord Jesus Christ. (Ruth). God always blesses those who choose to trust and follow Him.

There are so many examples of people in Scripture who would not compromise their faith despite the threat of dire consequences.

The three Hebrew Slaves who refused to worship the golden statue of King Nebuchadnezzar. (Daniel 3).

Daniel himself, who despite the threat of the lion's den chose not to obey the edict of King Darius to cease praying to any other God save the king himself. (Daniel 6)


Thomas, who despite the consequences of his stubborn unbelief initially chose not to believe the report that Jesus had risen from the dead but who afterwards on seeing the nail prints on His hands and the wound on His side proclaimed, "my Lord and my God." (John 20:26-29.)

His death was not caused by the envy and hatred of the religious leaders of Israel. Nor was it the result of the actions of the cruel and dominant Roman power of His day.

Bring us your peace. Fill us with your Holy Spirit. Send us onto our daily front lines to share your resurrection


peace and hope and love with those who are lost and lonely.
